A. LABOR DAY REMINDER

B. NATIONAL NIGHT OUT

Executive Summary

Introduction

At the August 3, 2016 regular meeting, the City Council resolved to introduce the ordinance amending Sections 8-28 and 8-28A of the Sterling Heights City Code to update the City's requirements relating to dangerous and potentially dangerous dogs.

Background

In 2011, the City adopted comprehensive regulations in Chapter 8 of the City Code to create a unique model for addressing community concerns about dangerous and potentially dangerous dogs.

As with any program, experience has identified a number of practices that would benefit by revisions to the City's regulations. The revisions being proposed are designed to streamline parts of the appeal process for more efficiency, to further clarify a dog owner's responsibilities, and to more clearly identify the roles of Animal Control and the City Clerk in the dog registration process.

Proposed Ordinance

The City Code currently authorizes Animal Control to categorize a dog involved in an aggressive behavior incident as either *dangerous* or *potentially dangerous*, depending on factors relating to the severity of the incident.

The proposed amendments to the process for determining a dog to be *dangerous* are limited to the following:

1. Clarification of the information to be included in the notice provided to the owner of a dog determined to be dangerous.
2. A new requirement for the City to provide notice of any appeal hearings to any victims involved in the incident.
3. A new requirement that the involved dog will be microchipped if another community authorizes the dog to be relocated to that community, so that the City can ensure that the dog not only leaves with the permission of that community, but also never returns.

The proposed amendments to the process for determining a dog to be *potentially dangerous* are limited to the following:

1. In addition to the aggressive behaviors already included in the ordinance for determining a dog to be potentially dangerous, the proposed ordinance would add that the City may classify a dog as potentially dangerous if any of those behaviors are discovered to have occurred in, and were documented by, any other community.
2. The process for appealing a classification of "potentially dangerous" to the Board of Ordinance Appeals will be streamlined to minimize holding times for the dogs involved. After the owner requests an appeal, the hearing will be scheduled for the next meeting of the Board that is set for more than 3 days after the appeal is received (or sooner if an earlier meeting is already scheduled and the owner waives the 3-day requirement).
3. The ordinance will clarify that ownership of the dog is forfeited to the City if the owner does not appeal, does not relocate the dog out of the City, and does not fulfill all of the conditions set forth in the ordinance for being able to possess a potentially dangerous dog. This would then allow the City to relocate the dog to a new owner or to authorize the County to do so.
4. The ordinance will clarify that Animal Control and the Board can extend any deadlines if the owner is making good faith progress toward relocation or fulfillment of the ordinance conditions.
5. The ordinance will establish that the owner has 14 days to comply with a decision of the Board to uphold the dog's classification as potentially dangerous, after which time ownership of the dog will be forfeited to the City.
6. The process for removing the potentially dangerous classification will be updated to clarify that the dog must reside and be licensed in the City for 3 full years, without any new incidents that would qualify the dog as potentially dangerous, following the date the dog is registered with the City as a potentially dangerous dog.

7. The revisions will clarify that any dog determined to be potentially dangerous must be impounded at that time. However, rather than require that the dog be housed at the County Shelter, Animal Control may authorize the dog (first it must be microchipped) to be kept at a residence outside of the City or with a rescue organization or dog lodging establishment until conclusion of the appeal process, compliance with the ordinance conditions for the dog to return home, or until permanent relocation out of the City. All costs are the owner's responsibility.
8. The requirements for keeping a potentially dangerous dog in the City will be revised as follows:
 - a. The fencing requirement will be updated to clarify that chain link and/or privacy fencing is acceptable, and that all required permits and inspections must be issued and completed prior to the dog's return to the property.
 - b. The temperament and training requirements can be approved by Animal Control, rather than requiring updates to an Administrative Policy & Procedure Order to list all approved programs.
 - c. The dog must be spayed or neutered prior to returning to the City. This was previously only required if the owner of the dog was a felon, but all involved administrators agree that it is an appropriate requirement for every dog that is classified as potentially dangerous.
 - d. Before returning to the City, the owner must register the dog as potentially dangerous with the City Clerk and provide proof of the fencing, gate, leash, microchipping, insurance, and training, and provide Animal Control and the City Clerk with 2 color photographs of the dog.
 - e. Dogs that are only visiting the City when an incident occurs will not be subject to the same requirements if they were licensed in another community at the time of the incident, except that they must be microchipped before release from impoundment and may not return to the City unless the conditions for possessing a potentially dangerous dog are fully implemented.

Recommendation

The City's regulations have, by any measure, proven to be very successful and are functioning as intended. Over the course of the past five years, the regulations have allowed the City to effectively manage some very difficult cases, including those involving legal challenges. While the City could continue to rely on existing regulations, those involved in the process have identified specific measures that will enhance the efficiency of the overall program. For all these reasons, recommendation is being made to introduce and adopt the attached ordinance to update the City's requirements relating to dangerous and potentially dangerous dogs

ORDINANCE NO. _____

**AN ORDINANCE TO UPDATE CHAPTER 8 OF THE CITY CODE
GOVERNING DANGEROUS DOGS**

THE CITY OF STERLING HEIGHTS ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. Section 8-28 of Chapter 8 of the City Code shall be amended to read as follows:

8-28. POTENTIALLY DANGEROUS DOGS.

The purpose of this section is to establish a procedure for identifying dogs that pose a potential or significant threat to the safety of people, animals, or property, to impose precautionary restrictions on such dogs in an effort to prevent a serious injury from occurring, and to promote responsible ownership of all dogs within the city.

(A) Determination of a potentially dangerous dog. The determination that a dog is potentially dangerous shall be based on the following specific behaviors exhibited by the dog:

(1) Menaces, chases, displays threatening or aggressive behavior toward, or otherwise threatens or endangers the safety of a person or domestic animal.

(2) Causes injury to a person or domestic animal that is less than a severe injury. For purposes of this section, the term "severe" injury means permanent, serious disfigurement, serious impairment of health, or serious impairment of a bodily function.

(3) Aggressively bites a person or domestic animal. For purposes of this section, the term "aggressively bites" means the dog physically bit the person or animal in a manner not normally associated with playfulness or accidental behavior while exhibiting objective signs of aggression, attack behavior, or intent to harm. The damage inflicted by a bite, or lack thereof, may also be used by animal control officials as a factor in determining whether a bite was aggressive.

(4) Any of the behaviors listed above exhibited in another community and documented in an official report of any law enforcement or animal control agency.

(B) Notice of determination and right of appeal. An animal control officer shall have the authority to make a determination that a dog is potentially dangerous if the animal control officer concludes the dog has exhibited the behaviors specified in this section. The owner or keeper of a dog determined to be potentially dangerous shall be provided with a notice containing the following information:

(1) A summary of the findings that form the basis for the determination that the dog is potentially dangerous.

(2) Notice of requirements necessary to possess a potentially dangerous dog in the city.

(3) Notice of the right to submit a written appeal of the determination that the dog is potentially dangerous to the Board of Ordinance Appeals within 10 calendar days from the date of the notice. The notice shall:

(a) Provide instructions for taking an appeal;

(b) Indicate that the appeal will be considered at the next regular meeting of the Board of Ordinance Appeals to be held at least 3 calendar days from the date of the notice, unless an earlier meeting is scheduled and the owner requests in writing for the appeal to be heard at that meeting;

(c) Indicate that the determination that the dog is potentially dangerous is final and conclusive if an appeal is not taken; and

(d) Indicate that ownership of the dog will be deemed forfeited to the city if any of the following occur:

a. An appeal is not taken and the owner has not secured permanent relocation of the dog or satisfied all of the requirements set forth below for possession of a potentially dangerous dog within 14 calendar days from the date of the notice.

b. The Board of Ordinance Appeals upholds the determination that the dog is potentially dangerous and the owner or keeper has not secured permanent relocation of the dog or satisfied all of the conditions set forth in this section, and any other conditions established by the Board, for possessing the potentially dangerous dog within 14 days of the appeal hearing.

c. Animal control and the Board of Ordinance Appeals shall have the authority, but no obligation, to extend any of the deadlines set forth in this subsection for demonstrable good faith progress toward relocation of the dog or toward satisfaction of the possession requirements.

(4) Notice of the right to request removal of the potentially dangerous classification after the dog has resided and been licensed within the city for a minimum of 3 full years following the date the dog is licensed with the City as a potentially dangerous dog without any violations of the conditions required for keeping the potentially dangerous dog and without any new incidents involving behavior by the dog that would qualify for a potentially dangerous determination pursuant to this section. The removal request shall be sent in writing to animal control. The decision to remove the potentially dangerous classification shall be made in the first instance by animal control upon a review of the history of the dog and its residence for the 3 years preceding the date of the removal request, including a premises inspection and an inspection of the dog to

ensure that the conditions set forth in this section have been followed. If the request is denied, the owner may appeal the denial to the Board of Ordinance Appeals within 10 calendar days. Owners shall only be permitted one request and one appeal during any 12-month period.

(C) Mitigating circumstances. An animal control officer shall have discretion to refrain from making a potentially dangerous determination if the animal control officer determines that the behavior was the result of the victim abusing or tormenting the dog, was directed toward a trespasser or person committing or attempting to commit a crime, involved accidental or instinctive behavior while playing, did not involve a significant injury, or other similar mitigating or extenuating circumstances.

(D) Impoundment. A dog that is determined to be potentially dangerous shall be removed from the City and placed with the Macomb County Animal Shelter or, in the discretion of Animal Control, the owner may authorize placement of the dog at a residential home outside of the City, or with a qualified rescue organization or qualified dog lodging business, during any quarantine period and until the owner has either confirmed a new place of residence for the dog outside of the City or has exhausted any appeals permitted by this section. If the dog is not being housed at the Shelter, it must first be microchipped with all information required by Animal Control. All impoundment, lodging, and microchipping costs are the sole responsibility of the dog's owner.

(E) Requirements for possession of a potentially dangerous dog. If the owner of the dog requests that the dog be permitted to return to the City, its return shall not be permitted until the following requirements have been satisfied:

(1) Animal control shall confirm the following:

- a. The owner or keeper shall install secure fencing at the property where the dog will reside which is maintained in good repair with self-locking ingress or egress gates. The fencing may be any combination of chain link fencing and/or privacy fencing, shall only be installed upon obtaining all required fence permits from the City, and shall pass all required inspections prior to the dog's return to the property,
- b. When removed from the property of the owner or keeper, a potentially dangerous dog shall always be restrained by a secure leash of no more than four feet in length and under the control of a capable person.
- c. A potentially dangerous dog shall have a microchip implanted by a licensed veterinarian. The microchip shall contain the name and approximate age of the dog, its classification as potentially dangerous, and the name, address, and telephone number of the registered owner.
- d. The owner shall obtain and maintain public liability insurance with policy coverage in the minimum amount of \$250,000.

- e. Two recent color photographs of the dog, which clearly show the color and approximate size of the animal, shall be provided to animal control.
- f. The potentially dangerous dog shall meet the requirements of the AKC's Canine Good Citizen Program, or its equivalent, to the satisfaction of animal control. Dogs that are under one year of age are ineligible for the AKC Canine Good Citizen Program, so such dogs must be enrolled in or have completed the AKC START Program or an equivalent approved by animal control. The dog may not return to its City residence until these requirements have been met, but it may be kept at a qualified rescue or dog housing business until proof of successful completion of the program is submitted to, and acknowledged by, animal control and the city clerk. For every future violation of this chapter for which a dog may be determined to be potentially dangerous which occurs after the dog has completed the requirements of this subsection and been properly registered under this section, additional training or testing, including but not limited to renewing the dog's compliance with this subsection, may be imposed by animal control as a condition of continuing to keep the dog within the city unless the dog's status is changed to dangerous due to the nature or frequency of the new violation(s).
- g. The potentially dangerous dog, if over 12 weeks old, has been spayed or neutered.
- h. All impoundment and lodging costs have been paid by the owner.

(2) Before the dog returns to any property within the city other than a qualified rescue organization or a boarding business, the owner of a potentially dangerous dog shall ensure that the dog's license is current and shall register the dog with the city clerk as a potentially dangerous dog with all information required by the city clerk's potentially dangerous dog registration form, as well as the following:

- a. Proof of animal control's certification that the required fence, self-locking gate, and leash have all been procured for the dog.
- b. Proof of microchipping and the information contained on the microchip. The owner shall ensure that the microchip information provided to the city is kept up to date.
- c. Proof of the required insurance policy.
- d. Proof of the successful completion of the required training and temperament testing.
- e. Two recent color photographs of the dog, which clearly show the color and approximate size of the animal.

(3) The owner or keeper of a potentially dangerous dog must, within 10 business days, report to the city clerk if the dog has been permanently removed from the city, has died, or has

relocated within the city. The new address of a relocated potentially dangerous dog shall be provided as part of the report to the city clerk.

(4) After its initial registration, a potentially dangerous dog shall be registered with the city clerk annually and its owner or keeper shall pay a registration fee established by the city's annual appropriations ordinance. This registration and fee shall be in addition to any other requirements for annual licensing of an animal.

(E) Visiting Dogs. Any dog that does not reside within the city and is licensed by another community but which is determined to be a potentially dangerous dog pursuant to this section shall not be subject to the conditions for possessing a potentially dangerous dog within the city, except that the dog shall be microchipped before its release, all impound and microchipping costs shall be paid by the owner, and its owner and keeper shall be advised by animal control that the dog is not to return unless all of the conditions for possessing a potentially dangerous dog are first satisfied. In the event the dog is subsequently in the city without full compliance with the requirements for possessing a potentially dangerous dog, the person harboring or possessing the dog shall be subject to the penalties set forth in subsection (F).

(F) Penalties.

(1) Except as provided in division (F)(2), any person who owns, harbors, keeps, or possesses a potentially dangerous dog in violation of any of the requirements of this section for possessing a potentially dangerous dog, or who in any way aids or abets such ownership, harboring, keeping, or possession, shall be responsible for a municipal civil infraction. The fine for a first violation shall be \$500; for a second violation, \$750; and for all subsequent violations, \$1,000 per violation. The court may only waive or reduce these fines in cases of financial hardship, upon good cause shown, if the offender forfeits all ownership and possessory rights to the offending dog and forfeits future dog ownership and possessory rights until the offender has successfully completed animal ownership educational training satisfactory to the city's animal control officers and for a period of time determined appropriate by the court.

(2) In addition to the civil penalties set forth in division (F)(1), a potentially dangerous dog shall be subject to immediate impoundment by an animal control officer if it is determined that the dog is owned, possessed, harbored or maintained in violation of this section. The animal control officer shall issue a notice to the owner or keeper of the potentially dangerous dog which indicates the hearing date at which the city's Board of Ordinance Appeals will address the violations. The city shall provide notice of the hearing to any victim and/or any owner of an animal victimized by the potentially dangerous dog.

(3) Any hearing scheduled for consideration by the Board of Ordinance Appeals shall be administratively canceled if the owner or keeper withdraws the requested appeal, corrects all correctable violations to the satisfaction of animal control, satisfies the conditions for possessing a potentially dangerous dog, permanently relocates the dog to the satisfaction of animal control, or forfeits ownership rights to the potentially dangerous dog prior to the scheduled Board hearing,. The owner or keeper shall be responsible for all impound fees and costs, regardless of whether the hearing is held or canceled. If a hearing is held, the Board shall:

(a) Determine whether the status of the dog as potentially dangerous shall be upheld and, if so, the conditions applicable for return of the potentially dangerous dog to the owner or keeper, including but not limited to deadlines for correcting any uncorrected violations and random inspections of the premises and the potentially dangerous dog by an animal control officer, with the owner or keeper responsible for payment of inspection fees established by the city's annual appropriations ordinance. In the event of noncompliance, the Board may impose conditions on removal from the city that are rationally related to the public interest in protecting others from any potential future harm that could be caused by the potentially dangerous dog. Failure to comply or remove the dog in accordance with the decision of the Board within the timeframe established by the Board shall result in forfeiture of ownership rights to the dog in favor of the city, in which event animal control shall determine the final placement or disposition of the dog.

Statutory reference:

Dangerous animals, see M.C.L. § 287.321 et seq.

SECTION 2. Section 8-28A of Chapter 8 of the City Code shall be amended to read as follows:

8-28A. DANGEROUS DOG.

(A) Determination of a dangerous dog. The determination that a dog is dangerous shall be based on the following specific behaviors exhibited by the dog:

(1) Exhibits aggressive behaviors that result in further incidents or complaints after having been determined to be a potentially dangerous dog.

(2) Causes severe injury to a person or domestic animal. For purposes of this section, the term “severe” injury means permanent, serious disfigurement, serious impairment of health, or serious impairment of a bodily function.

(3) Kills a person or domestic animal.

(4) Its use in the commission of a crime, including but not limited to dog fighting and guarding of illegal operations.

(B) Notice of determination. The definition of “dangerous animal” in § [8-3](#) shall continue for purposes of issuing violations for harboring a dangerous or vicious animal pursuant to § [8-8](#). An animal control officer shall have the additional authority to make a determination that a dog is to be classified as dangerous under this article if the animal control officer concludes the dog has exhibited the behaviors specified in this section. The owner or keeper of a dog determined to be dangerous shall be provided with a notice containing the following information:

(1) A summary of the findings that form the basis for the determination that the dog is dangerous.

- (2) Notice of the prohibition of dangerous dogs within the city.
- (3) Notice of the right to appeal, as set forth below.

(C) Mitigating circumstances. An animal control officer shall have discretion to refrain from making a determination of a dangerous dog if the animal control officer determines that the behavior was the result of the victim abusing or tormenting the dog, was directed toward a trespasser or person committing or attempting to commit a crime, or other similar mitigating or extenuating circumstances. The animal control officer retains discretion, however, to classify the dog as potentially dangerous if the mitigating circumstances do not completely dispel concern about the dog's future behaviors.

(D) Impoundment and euthanization. A dangerous dog is not permitted within the city, shall be immediately impounded, and shall be euthanized not less than 10 calendar days after a determination is made by an animal control officer.

(E) Right of appeal. The animal control officer shall issue a notice to the owner or keeper of the right to appeal the determination that a dog is dangerous to the Board of Ordinance Appeals within 10 calendar days from the date of the notice. The notice shall provide instructions for taking an appeal and indicate that the determination is final and conclusive if an appeal is not taken. The city shall provide notice of the hearing to any victim and/or any owner of an animal victimized by the dangerous dog. If the owner forfeits ownership rights to the dangerous dog or obtains written permission to relocate the dog to another municipality from that municipality's chief administrative officer or chief animal control official prior to the scheduled Board hearing, the matter shall be administratively withdrawn from the agenda. If relocation permission is obtained, the dog shall first be microchipped at the owner's expense with all information required by animal control, including the dog's designation as dangerous in Sterling Heights and information referencing the city's incident report(s). The owner or keeper shall be responsible for all impound fees and costs, regardless of whether the dog is forfeited, removed from the city, or a hearing is held. If a hearing is held, the Board shall determine whether the dog is dangerous and subject to forfeiture and euthanization.

SECTION 3. All other provisions of the Code of Ordinances not specifically amended shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon publication of a notice of adoption.

MINUTES OF REGULAR MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 3, 2016

IN CITY HALL

Mayor Michael C. Taylor called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m.

Mayor Taylor led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag and Mark Carufel, City Clerk, gave the Invocation.

Council Members present at roll call: Deanna Koski, Joseph V. Romano, Maria G. Schmidt, Nate Shannon, Doug Skrzyniarz, Michael C. Taylor, Barbara A. Ziarko.

Also Present: Jeffrey Bahorski, Assistant City Manager; Marc D. Kaszubski, City Attorney; Mark Carufel, City Clerk; Carol Sobosky, Recording Secretary.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Moved by Koski, seconded by Romano, to approve the Agenda as presented.

Yes: All. The motion carried.

REPORT FROM CITY MANAGER

Mr. Bahorski reported on the recent successful conclusion of the 15th annual *Sterlingfest Art & Music Fair*. He stated that, as a community event, *Sterlingfest*

is unsurpassed in bringing the Sterling Heights community together to have fun in the heart of the City, and he thanked all who gave time and effort to this year's successful event.

Mr. Bahorski reported that the Sterling Heights Assembly Plant (SHAP) announced a \$1.5 billion investment to move production of the next generation RAM 1500 pick-up truck to SHAP. In addition to the capital investment, there will be a workforce of over 4,000, and he stated the City worked closely with partners at the Michigan Economic Development Corporation and the County of Macomb for this project.

Mr. Bahorski reported on an act of heroism by a member of the Sterling Heights Police Department, where Officer Kevin McLellan assisted a resident whose husband was found unresponsive. He commenced CPR and continued until paramedics arrived, and the man is alive as a result of Officer McLellan's lifesaving actions. A recap of the WXYZ Channel 7 news story highlighting Officer McLellan's actions was shown.

Mr. Bahorski reported that *ReCreating Recreation*, which will be on November's ballot, has been garnering more interest, and he introduced Community Relations Director Bridget Doyle to highlight where more information on this initiative can be found.

Ms. Doyle informed that the City will be kicking off its public information campaign about *ReCreating Recreation*, which will be on the ballot this November. She informed that inserts in the water bill will be included in the

mailings through the next three cycles in August, September and October. There is a Q&A brochure that will be available at City Hall and all public buildings. There will be a video series that will be kicking off at this meeting, displays at all City events, and A-frame signage outside City buildings. Ms. Doyle informed there is a lot of information available through their website (www.sterling-heights.net), where there are multiple links to find more information on this initiative. She informed that the unique URL is www.sterling-heights.net/recreatingrecreation and that will link directly to the webpage, which include a slide show of images, a photo gallery, the plan, and a tax calculator where anyone can plug in their home's estimated market value to see what this will cost them on an annual basis. She stated the ballot language is also included on the webpage, and as the videos are created and populated, and this information will be shared on social media. She urged any residents with questions on this proposal to contact her, Mr. Kyle Langlois, the Parks and Recreation Director, or Ms. Denice Gerstenberg, the City Development Director. The first of three videos created by SHTV was shown, which she hoped will shed light on *ReCreating Recreation* and what it can do for the community. Following the video, Ms. Doyle stated if anyone has questions or finds there is not information on this part of the website, they can email her at bdoyle@sterling-heights.net and she will make sure the site is updated.

Mr. Bahorski commended Ms. Doyle and other staff for their outstanding production explaining what *Re*Creating Recreation is all about, and he stated that concludes his report.

PRESENTATION

Police Chief John Berg stated that as of today, including the three officers being sworn in, Sterling Heights has hired 35 new officers in the last 18 months, and he added they still have 18 more to hire. He explained that they will be starting a new process of recruiting and putting out information to all of the academies in the area. Chief Berg thanked Mr. Bahorski for highlighting Officer McLellan's lifesaving efforts, adding is proud of the position he holds and the people he oversees in his department. He introduced the three officers, recognizing that Julian Arche is the nephew of Sterling Heights Police Officer Al Arche, and Brian Browning was born and raised in Sterling Heights, graduating from Sterling Heights High School. He stated that Phillip Descamps is also from Sterling Heights, graduating from Cousino High School. He stated they all bring in a lot of knowledge and experience to the City.

Chief Berg swore in Officers Julian Arche, Brian Browning and Phillip Descamps.

Officer Phillip Decamps thanked the City Council, the Mayor, and his family and friends for their help and support, and looked forward to serving the City of Sterling Heights for many years.

Officer Brian Browning stated he grew up in Sterling Heights, and thanked the City Council, the Mayor and the Police Chief for affording him the opportunity to serve the city that he loves. He is looking forward to moving back into this community and thanked his family and fiancé for their support.

Officer Julian Arche stated it is great to be back in his home town and he looks forward to many years of successful police work in this city. He thanked the City Council and the Police Department for allowing him this opportunity, and he thanked his family and fiancé as well for their support.

Mayor Taylor welcomed the new police officers, and added that it is always encouraging to see people who have grown up in Sterling Heights finding a way to come back, which he felt is a reflection on the kind of community and Police Department here in Sterling Heights. He thanked the officers for their commitment and wished them well.

Ms. Denice Gerstenberg, City Development Director, informed that this evening the City is the honored recipient of an award from the Michigan Concrete Association (MCA). She stated that the City's Engineering Department is led by Mr. Brent Bashaw and a team committed to excellence, designing not only roads, water mains and sanitary sewers but also parks and parking lots, and the improvements at the Civic Center. Ms. Gerstenberg introduced Ms. Carrie Sutton, Director of Engineering for MCA.

Ms. Carrie Sutton stated that the MCA is comprised of contractors, consultants, material suppliers, testing firms and others involved in building infrastructure in Michigan. They hold an annual conference and look at projects they feel were outstanding the previous year, and she informed that the 19-1/2 Mile project (between Merrill and Utica Road) was submitted and won in the category of Industrial Roads. She stated over 70 projects were submitted, and only 25 were selected as winners. She explained the road was recognized for its use of concrete and design in the complete reconstruction of the road pavement, the base and the storm sewer, all done while keeping the businesses open. She recognized the contractor, Toby Construction; the sub-contractor, GM and Sons; the concrete supplier, Superior Materials; and City Engineer Brent Bashaw, Civil Engineer II Scott Charron, and Lead Engineering Inspector Adam LaClair of the City of Sterling Heights. She presented the 2016 Award of Excellence from the Michigan Concrete Association for the 19-1/2 Mile Road Reconstruction, City Project #14-255.

Mayor Taylor commended and thanked the Engineering Department for their great work, and commented on the large number of compliments he received from citizens with regard to the parking lot improvements following the Sterlingfest.

PUBLIC HEARING

1. Mr. Dwayne McLachlan, City Assessor, presented the request by Chardam Gear Company, Inc. to establish an Industrial Development District (IDD) at 40810 Brentwood Drive, 40765 Mound Road, 40805 Mound Road and 40821 Mound

Road. He stated the petitioners will have to come back before this Council to ask for a formal tax abatement. He stated the petitioners have indicated they would like to delay this request indefinitely; however, since this is a public hearing that was already advertised, he encouraged City Council to hold the public hearing and then postpone it indefinitely.

Mayor Taylor opened the discussion to the audience.

There was no audience participation.

Mayor Taylor closed the public hearing.

Moved by Romano, seconded by Ziarko, **RESOLVED**, to postpone indefinitely consideration of the application by Chardam Gear Company, Inc., to establish an Industrial Development District at 40810 Brentwood Drive, 40765 Mound Road, 40805 Mound Road and 40821 Mound Road.

Yes: All. The motion carried.

2. Mr. Dwayne McLachlan, City Assessor, presented the request by Ric-Man Construction, Inc. for an Industrial Facilities Tax Exemption Certificate at 42600 R Mancini Drive, located off of 19 Mile Road. The district was created at an earlier meeting this year. He stated the applicant is constructing a new facility and intends to build products for their continued business use in utility mining and maintenance of construction equipment. They will invest approximately \$3.3 million in building this facility, and anticipate adding an additional \$680,000 of new personal property, and those assets are taxed directly by the State. The real property investment will generate approximately \$12,644 annually in new city tax

revenue over the eight-year abatement term, and the tax revenue is in addition to the current city taxes, which over the same eight-year term, would equate to approximately \$168,263 annually for all Mancini-affiliated entities. This is expected to create ten new jobs within the City, and will have a positive economic effect.

Mayor Taylor opened the public hearing.

Mr. Eddie Mancini, applicant, explained they have been in this City for 51 years and would like to stay here. He stated they are creating a new 42,000-square-foot facility and growing their business. They manufacture construction equipment that facilitates their needs for doing jobs throughout the State of Michigan, and they also manage and develop properties in Sterling Heights, including one property along Van Dyke where they will be breaking ground for a 72,000-square-foot facility. He distributed and reviewed an informative packet showing the machinery they can build at their facility.

Mayor Taylor closed the public hearing.

Moved by Schmidt, seconded by Romano, **RESOLVED**, that the application for an Industrial Facilities Tax Exemption Certificate by Ric-Man Construction, Inc. at 42600 R Mancini Drive is hereby approved for a period of eight years in accordance with the guidelines established by City Council and the Mayor and City Clerk are hereby authorized to sign, as applicable, all documents required in conjunction with this approval.

Councilwoman Schmidt commented that 51 years in the community is a long time, and she thanked the petitioner for staying here and continuing to invest in this City. She also appreciated the new jobs being created, and she wished him well.

Mayor Taylor echoed Councilwoman Schmidt's remarks. He stated it is good to see companies like this that do a good job and want to stay in the city, and he thanked them for being invested and committed to the City of Sterling Heights and the local economy.

Yes: All. The motion carried.

3. Mr. Jason Castor, City Development Manager, stated that at the July 7, 2016 Regular Meeting, the City Council scheduled a public hearing to hear any objections to changing the street name of "Ford Country Lane" to "Suburban Drive". Since that time, the Notice of Public Hearing has been posted in three places on the street and has been published in the Sentry Newspaper for at least ten days as specified in the Ordinance. Mr. Castor showed the proposed road on a map, and stated it is a private access drive on the west side of Van Dyke Avenue, between 17 and 18 Mile Roads. It was constructed along with the development of the Jerome Duncan Ford Automobile Dealership, which has since been renamed to Suburban Ford of Sterling Heights. He advised that the name change request has been reviewed by the city's Police, Fire, Public Works and Engineering Departments, and all have indicated no objection to the request. He stated the petitioner, Mr. David Fisher, General Manager, was unable to attend this evening

but submitted a letter indicating their primary reason for the name change is to reflect their company name. Mr. Castor stated that Mr. Fisher's designated representative is present tonight to answer questions.

Mayor Taylor opened the public hearing.

There was no audience participation.

Mayor Taylor closed the public hearing.

Moved by Ziarko, seconded by Schmidt, **RESOLVED**, to approve the request to change the name of "Ford Country Lane" to "Suburban Drive" and authorize the Mayor and City Clerk to sign all documentation required in conjunction with this approval.

Councilwoman Ziarko stated the request was explained to the City Council, as well as the reason for the petitioner asking for this change, and she indicated that she has no objection to the request.

Mayor Pro-Tem Romano pointed out that if this is approved, the City maps will still reflect "Ford Country Lane" unless the maps are changed. He inquired as to whether there are any buildings on that street that would be having mail addressed to "Ford Country Lane".

Mr. Castor replied to inquiry that there are three or four buildings with addresses on "Ford Country Lane". He clarified, however, that after contacting the post office, the City was advised to supply the post office with a copy of the official recommendation to change the street name, and they will update their address records to reflect "Suburban Drive".

Mayor Pro-Tem Romano stated that companies on that street will all have to change their letterhead, and he inquired as to whether they were notified of tonight's public hearing.

Mr. Castor clarified that all of the properties located on that drive are owned by the Suburban Collection so they are all aware of the proposed name change.

Yes: All. The motion carried.

ORDINANCE INTRODUCTION

4. Mayor Taylor stated that this is to consider introducing an ordinance amending Sections 8-28 and 8-28A of Chapter 8 of the City Code to update the City's requirements relating to dangerous and potentially dangerous dogs.

Mr. Donald P. DeNault, Assistant City Attorney, stated that in 2011, the City put together a unique model that has not been followed in other communities, but the City's Animal Control Department, City Development Director and City Clerk all agree that it is working very well. He stated it is time to look at it again to see if it can be streamlined. He explained the proposed amendments to the process for determining a dog to be dangerous, including new requirements which would provide notice of any appeal hearings to any victims involved in the incident, and microchipping the involved dog if another community authorizes the dog to be relocated to that community. Mr. DeNault also explained the proposed amendments involve the process for determining a dog to be potentially dangerous, and also for keeping a potentially dangerous dog in the City.

Mr. Jeffrey Norgrove - affect on the future dog park, including access and prohibiting vicious dogs, fences to separate the dogs, keeping dangerous or potentially dangerous dogs out of the dog park.

Moved by Schmidt, seconded by Ziarko, **RESOLVED**, to introduce the ordinance amending Chapter 8, Sections 8-28 and 8-28A of the City Code, to update the City's requirements relating to dangerous and potentially dangerous dogs.

Councilwoman Schmidt stated Mr. Norgrove brought up a good point, and inquired as to whether these concerns would be more appropriately addressed in rules for using the dog park, or whether it would be pertinent to address them in this ordinance.

Mr. DeNault replied it was not included in the proposed amendments because they do not have a dog park at this time; however, he stated it would be a valid consideration at such time as a dog park is being developed and they will have to talk about it at that point. He clarified that if a dog has been deemed to be dangerous, it is not allowed in the City, and so it will not be an issue as to whether or not it can enter the dog park. They are only talking about the dogs on the watch list.

Mr. Bahorski replied that a dog park is preliminary at this time, but he stated that any dog that would be admitted to a dog park through a card swipe system would have to be vaccinated, licensed and meet every city requirement. He added it would involve cross-referencing a database, and he was confident the City can

handle that situation. With regard to large dogs versus small dogs, they would be looking at best practices and what dog parks work. He anticipated they would separate large dogs from small dogs based on size but not breed identification.

Mayor Pro-Tem Romano stated nothing is foolproof, estimating that probably 99% of the dogs in Sterling Heights are well-mannered dogs, but it is the 1% for which they have to be concerned. He stated most people are smart enough to realize if they have a potentially dangerous dog they need to take proper precautions by keeping the dog chained or leashed because they could be facing a large liability. He agreed with the idea of separating the large dogs from the small dogs when a dog park is created, but added that the City will come up with rules and regulations at that time. He complimented Mr. DeNault and Ms. Gerstenberg for doing a good job on this ordinance amendment.

Yes: All. The motion carried.

ORDINANCE ADOPTION

5. Mayor Taylor stated they are considering the adoption of an ordinance amending Chapter 37 of the Sterling Heights City Code to increase the setback distances from public sidewalks and public roadways by 7 feet for enclosed utility trailers in single-family residential areas and to require an approved surface for storage in side and rear yard areas.

Ms. Linda Godfrey - individuals and business owners affected by this ordinance, consider waiver of permit fees.

Moved by Romano, seconded by Ziarko, **RESOLVED**, to adopt the ordinance amending Chapter 37 of the Sterling Heights City Code to increase the setback distances from public sidewalks and public roadways by 7 feet for enclosed utility trailers in single-family residential areas and to require an approved surface for storage in side and rear yard areas.

Mayor Pro-Tem Romano inquired as to whether there have been any allowances made for people who have already pulled permits.

Ms. Gerstenberg replied that the change in the setback is going to be for people who keep large utility trailers in their driveways. They are hoping to encourage these people to move these large trailers off of their driveways. She estimated that there are four persons in the City that this ordinance would affect.

Mayor Taylor did not feel the grandfathering will be an issue because residents who had their side lots improved and obtained permits will not have to do it again. Those who are parking the utility vehicle in their driveway have to pay a permit fee regardless, and the purpose of this ordinance is to encourage those people not to park large utility trailers that extend from their garage almost up to the sidewalk. He could see no reason to exempt those for whom the City is trying to influence to stop parking their large utility trailers in their driveways.

ORDINANCE NO. 448

AN ORDINANCE TO UPDATE CHAPTER 37 OF THE CITY CODE BY INCREASING THE SETBACK DISTANCE FROM SIDEWALKS AND PUBLIC ROADWAYS BY 7 FEET FOR ENCLOSED UTILITY TRAILERS IN SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL AREAS

THE CITY OF STERLING HEIGHTS ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. Section 37-23 of Chapter 37 of the City Code shall be amended to add the following definition in alphabetical order:

UTILITY TRAILER, ENCLOSED. Any utility trailer with an interior that is fully or partially enclosed.

SECTION 2. Section 37-24(A)(2)(b) of Chapter 37 of the City Code shall be amended to add a new subsection (i) to read as follows:

37-24. REGULATION OF PARKING AND STORAGE.

b. The unit shall be parked or stored no closer than 8 feet from any public sidewalk or no closer than 7 feet from the front lot line where no public sidewalk exists.

- (i) Exception: Effective January 1, 2017, an enclosed utility trailer shall not be parked or stored any closer than 15 feet from any public sidewalk and no closer than 14 feet from the front lot line where no public sidewalk exists.

SECTION 3. Section 37-24(B)(1) of Chapter 37 of the City Code shall be amended to add a new subsection a. to read as follows:

(1) The unit shall be parked or stored no closer than 8 feet from any public sidewalk or no closer than 7 feet from the front lot line, where no public sidewalk exists;

- a. Exception: Effective January 1, 2017, an enclosed utility trailer shall not be parked or stored any closer than 15 feet from any public sidewalk and no closer than 14 feet from the front lot line where no public sidewalk exists.

SECTION 4. Section 37-24 of Chapter 37 of the City Code shall be amended to add a new subsection (J) to read as follows:

(J) Effective January 1, 2017, units shall at all times be parked or stored on a surface consisting of asphalt, concrete, pavers, or an alternative material approved by the Building Official as suitable for ensuring proper maintenance of the area where the specific unit is being parked or stored. The surface must be maintained in accordance with all applicable provisions of the City Code, including any applicable provisions of the International Property Maintenance Code, as may be adopted and locally amended from time to time.

SECTION 5. Section 37-24 of Chapter 37 of the City Code shall be amended to add a new subsection (K) to read as follows:

(K) For purposes of this section, distance limitations shall be measured from any part of the unit closest from a direct line to the location from which it must be set back, including the body of the unit, the tongue of the unit, and any other protrusion of or from the unit, and length limitations shall include the body of the unit, the tongue of the unit, fender, wheel, and any other protrusion of or from the unit.

SECTION 6. All other provisions of the Code of Ordinances not specifically amended shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 7. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon publication of a notice of adoption.

Executive Summary:

The City of Sterling Heights is committed to creating a comprehensive and complete sidewalk system for pedestrians and bicyclists along the City's major arterial corridors. Unfortunately, due to the size of the City, gaps in the sidewalk exist, typically adjacent to vacant parcels. These gaps are being filled as part of development of the adjacent property by the owner or under the City's sidewalk gap program.

A sidewalk gap exists along 17 Mile Road, between Utica Road and Schoenherr Road, and proceeding north on the west side of Schoenherr Road from Utica Road to Clinton River Road. Pedestrians and bicyclists use this route as evidenced by the well-established dirt path. Please see the adjacent site map.

City Project #16-288 is designed to fill the existing sidewalk gap through the construction of a five-foot wide sidewalk through this area. In addition, City Project #16-288 provides a vehicular safety barrier for pedestrians using the existing sidewalk on the Schoenherr Road bridge deck over the Clinton River.

Bids for City Project #16-288 were received on Tuesday, July 26, 2016 at 2:30 p.m. The Office of Engineering recommends that the bid for Schoenherr Road Sidewalk - 17 Mile Road to Clinton River Road, City Project #16-288, be awarded to Z Contractors, Inc., 50500 Design Lane, Shelby Township, MI 48315 at a total cost of \$299,999.00. Funding for City Project #16-288 are budgeted in the Fiscal Year 2016/17 budget to complete this project.

GENERAL INFORMATION:

The Schoenherr Road Sidewalk - 17 Mile Road to Clinton River Road, City Project #16-288, provides for the installation of over half a mile of sidewalk along 17 Mile Road, between Utica Road and Schoenherr Road, and proceeding north on the west side of Schoenherr Road from Utica Road to Clinton River Road. The proposed route will connect existing sidewalks along Clinton River Road and Utica Road and provide pedestrians and bicyclists access to Dodge Park. Schoenherr Road crosses the Clinton River approximately half way between Clinton River Road and 17 Mile Road. The river crossing will be accomplished by utilizing the existing sidewalk on the bridge deck and a safety barrier will be constructed between the edge of the sidewalk and vehicular curb lane.

This route is used frequently as evidenced by the worn footpath that has developed adjacent to Schoenherr Road. The installation of approximately 2,750 lineal feet of sidewalk along Schoenherr Road and 17 Mile Road, from Utica Road to Clinton River Road, will provide a safe and means for the public to continue to use this route for walking and bicycle riding.

In addition to filling a gap in the City's network of 610 miles of sidewalk and pathways and providing linkage to the existing regional, recreational path system within the City, this project will provide a safety barrier for pedestrians using the Schoenherr Road bridge over the Clinton River. Guardrail will also be added north and south of the bridge at the back of curb providing additional protection from the vehicle traffic.

TECHNICAL INFORMATION:

Funding for this project is budgeted in the Fiscal Year 2016/2017 budget. The bid award amount is \$299,999.00. The funding required to complete the project includes the construction cost of \$299,999.00 plus \$59,999.80 (20%) for engineering, inspection, material testing, and contract administration costs for a total of \$359,998.80.

STAFF ANALYSIS AND FINDINGS:

On Tuesday, July 26, 2016 at 2:30 p.m., bids were received for City Project #16-288. The two bid amounts were \$299,999.00 and \$445,750.00. The lower bid, submitted by Z Contractors, Inc. in the amount of \$299,999.00, is more than the Engineer's Estimate of \$264,566.00 by \$35,433.00, or 13.4%.

The low bid submitted by Z Contractors, Inc. conforms to the requirements of the bid specifications and reflects the value of the work. Z Contractors successfully completed the recent improvements to the Richard J. Notte City Center Repairs - Phase I. The Office of Engineering is satisfied with the performance of Z Contractors on this previous city project and is recommending an award to this contractor.

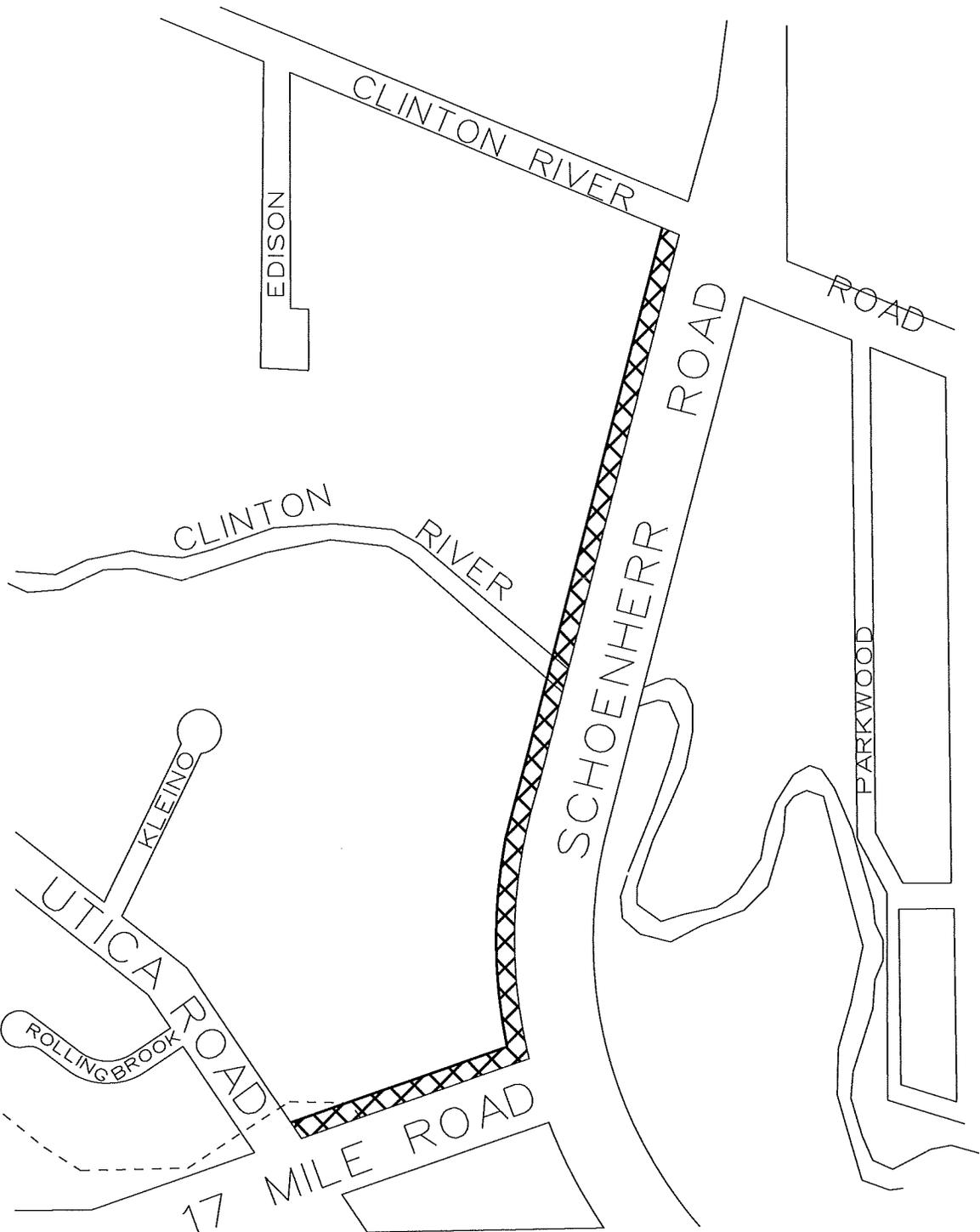

GENERAL INFORMATION:

Fifteen Mile Road, between Schoenherr Road and Morningdale Drive, is a five-lane road with two through lanes each for eastbound and westbound traffic and a center turn lane. The existing concrete pavement is in poor condition due primarily to joint failures that over time have created a rough and heavily-patched roadway. The condition worsened considerably from the effects of the severe winter in 2013/2014. The DPW has applied cold patch throughout the winter and in the spring of 2014 provided a more sustainable temporary repair through milling and hot mix placement.

City Project #14-259 provides a cost-effective repair that will that will improve the longevity of the road through the application of an asphalt overlay. The project will address structural deficiencies in the pavement and improve rideability.

TECHNICAL INFORMATION:

The existing concrete pavement will be milled and subsequently overlaid with three inches of asphalt. Base repairs and joint repairs will be made as necessary prior to the placement of the new asphalt for structural support. Please refer to the attached map for a depiction of the project limits.

The fiscal year 2016/2017 budget includes funding for City Project #14-259 in the amount of \$1,400,000.00. The total project cost equals \$1,157,518.00 (\$997,861.37 bid award plus \$159,657.00 (or 16%) for engineering, inspection, and contingency costs). Therefore, the existing budget is adequate to fund the project.

STAFF ANALYSIS AND FINDINGS:

On July 26, 2016 at 2:30 p.m., bids were received for 15 Mile Road Resurfacing, Schoenherr Road to Morningdale Drive, City Project #14-259. Five bids were received ranging from \$997,861.37 to \$1,230,410.00.

Pro-Line Asphalt Paving Corp., 11797 29 Mile Road, Washington, MI 48095, submitted the low bid in the amount of \$997,861.37. The bid is less than the Engineer's estimate by 17%.

The Office of Engineering conducted a thorough review of Pro-Line Asphalt's complete bid. References on Pro-Line Asphalt's 2016 projects have been contacted and proved positive. In addition, Pro-Line Asphalt has successfully completed three municipal projects for the City in

the last five years. The latest project completed was City Project #14-255, 19½ Mile Road Reconstruction in 2015. The Office of Engineering is satisfied with the performance of Pro-Line Asphalt on its prior city projects and is recommending an award to this contractor based upon its bid.

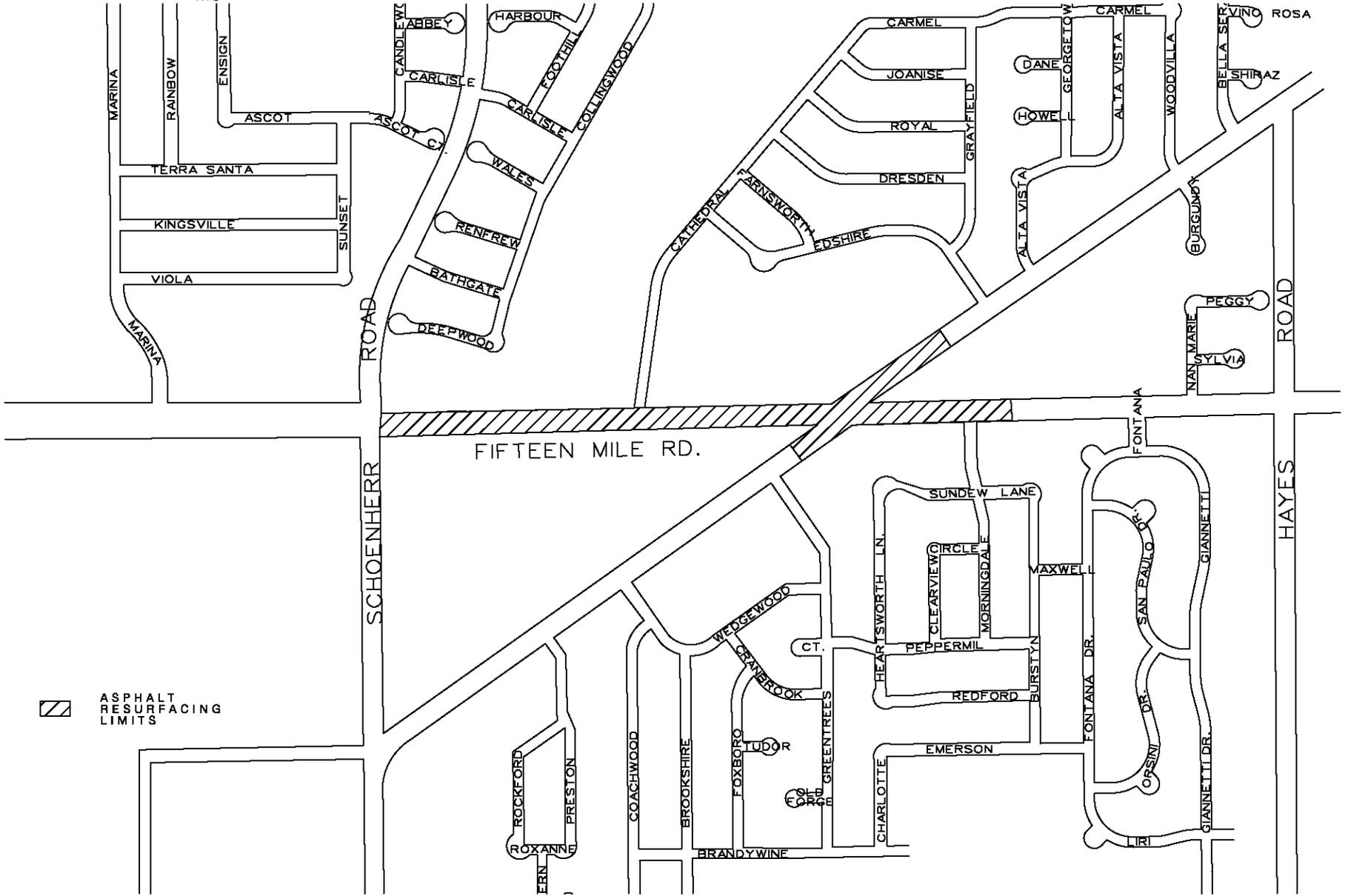

GENERAL INFORMATION: At the August 4, 2015 regular meeting, City Council awarded the bid for the subject City project in the amount of \$1,133,908.30. City Project #14-251 included the following work:

- Removal and replacement of the deteriorated concrete pavement at locations shown on the attached exhibit.
- To address recurring flooding and maintenance issues with the lower level of the Police Station, a minor reconfiguration of the rear parking lot and driveway into the lower level was constructed. In addition, a new pump station, storm sewer and trench drains were constructed to eliminate storm runoff from entering the Police Station.
- A new retaining wall at the northwest corner of the Police Station replaced the collapsed wall. A portion of the adjacent parking lot was reconfigured to allow a shorter retaining wall and space for a vegetated sloped earthen embankment. The stairs were removed and a walkway constructed along the paved entrance to the lower level of the Police Station.
- To address recurring flooding issues in City Hall, storm sewer improvements and a pump station were constructed on the west side of City Hall, north of the employee entrance. In addition, improvements were made to the east side lower level delivery area with new a new trench drain, pump station, storm sewer, and pavement grade correction.
- New landscaping was provided at various locations west and north of City Hall and the Police Station. The landscaping has an extended warranty.

TECHNICAL INFORMATION: The final contract price of \$1,188,920.48 is greater than the bid award amount of \$1,133,908.30 by 4.85%. The majority of the overage is due to additional pavement required and storm sewer system modifications required at the Police Station dock.

STAFF ANALYSIS AND FINDINGS: All work has been successfully completed on the subject project and the contractor has submitted the necessary Contractor's Declaration, Contractor's Affidavit, and Consent of Surety.

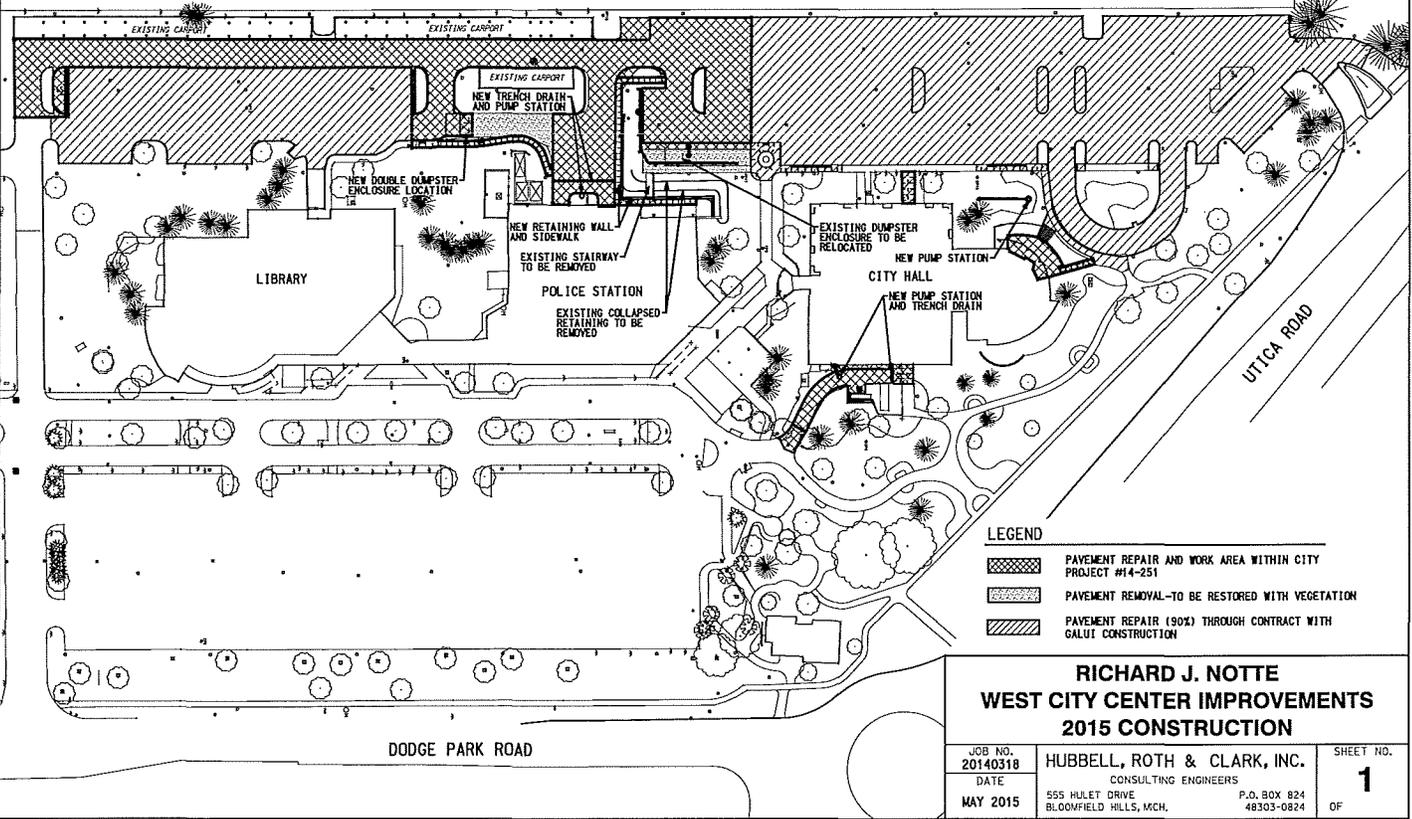

GENERAL INFORMATION: At the May 6, 2015 regular meeting, City Council awarded the bid for the subject City project in the amount of \$1,104,907.80. City Project #14-255 included the following work:

The existing concrete from Merrill Road to CONRAIL railway was removed and replaced at its current location with a 9" concrete pavement on a 6" limestone base. The pavement contains a 7" concrete curb and gutter. Edge drain was provided along the curb to provide for roadbed drainage. The pavement was striped with two through lanes and a center turn lane. The longitudinal/vertical grade and cross-slope were designed and constructed to meet current design standards. Access to all businesses was maintained throughout the duration of the project.

The existing asphalt pavement from CONRAIL railway to Utica Road was pulverized. An 8" asphalt pavement was constructed utilizing the pulverized material as the road base. The pavement was striped for two lanes and the bypass, acceleration, and deceleration lanes were reconstructed and remain at the existing locations.

TECHNICAL INFORMATION: The final contract price of \$1,161,458.45 is greater than the bid award amount of \$1,104,907.80 by 5.12%. The majority of the overage was derived from additional pay items that were required to vertically relocate the existing storm sewer due to inadequate clearances between the top of the pipe of the existing storm sewer and the bottom of the proposed concrete pavement.

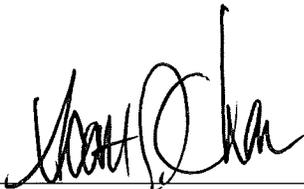

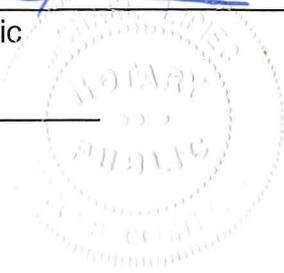

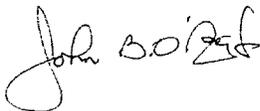

Executive Summary:

KUKACARES, a Michigan nonprofit corporation (Applicant), is an IRC 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation seeking to obtain a charitable gaming license through the State of Michigan.

A charitable gaming license will enhance Applicant's fundraising to support its stated purpose. Specifically, Applicant is seeking a state charitable gaming license to conduct a raffle at a Wild Game Dinner fundraiser on Friday October 14, 2016 at the Palazzo Grande banquet facility in Shelby Township.

In order to obtain a charitable gaming license to perform fundraising activities, the Charitable Gaming Division of the State of Michigan requires a resolution adopted by a local governing body recognizing the Applicant as a "local nonprofit group operating in the community."

Included in the backup are Applicant's Bylaws, Articles of Incorporation, IRS notification of IRC 501(c)(3) status, financial documents, and other information.

KUKACARES respectfully requests that the City of Sterling Heights consider approving a local governing body resolution to formally recognize KUKACARES as a nonprofit organization within the communities Sterling Heights and Macomb County.

KUKACARES is a nonprofit organization located in Sterling Heights and was formally incorporated on March 27, 2015. In January 2016 we were notified by the Internal Revenue Service that our application for recognition under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) had been approved. KUKACARES also does business as "KUKACARES Foundation" or "KUKACARES Foundation Inc."

KUKACARES is a completely separate legal enterprise which was formed as a spinoff from an internal employee welfare committee of KUKA Systems North America LLC. Members of the internal employee welfare committee were inspired by the idea of having a greater impact on the local community as a whole and thus endeavored to organize a separate legal entity with the sole purpose of directly supporting the well-being of families within the community. KUKACARES was formed together with the help of other members of our local business community right here in Sterling Heights. In fact, our board of directors has a majority of members who are not affiliated to KUKA entities through employment and thus we are able to capitalize on the collective creativity, inspiration, and drive of a range of leaders within our local business community.

Our organization was formed for the primary purpose of making a meaningful difference within our local community. However, it should be noted that KUKA employees are not eligible to receive any benefits from the KUKACARES legal entity as they may qualify for similar benefits from our internal employee welfare committee of the same name.

Over the past year we have held a number of charity events and have been successful in providing assistance to numerous members of our community right here in Sterling Heights and Macomb County. Specifically, in 2015 KUKACARES provided \$34,000 of direct assistance to 9 families and \$10,000 of assistance to other 501(c)(3) organizations. Thus far in 2016 we have provided \$22,800 of direct assistance to 9 families and \$28,000 of assistance to other 501(c)(3) organizations. In 2015 our donors consisted of a 232 individuals and corporations donating a grand total of approximately \$268,000. Our goal for 2016 is to grow both our donor base and total contributions by a minimum of at least 10%. In order to achieve this goal we have planned a charity dinner and raffle event with a wide range of corporate and individual sponsors. The event has been themed as a "Wild Game Dinner" and we have secured commitments from many local businesses to provided items which can be included in the raffle. We are hopeful that this event will be very successful and will be able to provide the means for KUKACARES to extend its impact on the local community. Some of our other charity events thus far have included a family bowling night, charity walk at the Detroit Zoo, and charity golf outing.

**BYLAWS
OF
KUKACARES FOUNDATION**

The name of the organization is KUKACARES Foundation. The organization is organized in accordance with the Nonprofit Corporation Act, Act 162 of 1982, as amended. The organization has not been formed for the making of any profit, or personal financial gain. The assets and income of the organization shall not be distributable to, or benefit the trustees, directors, or officers or other individuals. The assets and income shall only be used to promote corporate purposes as described below. Nothing contained herein, however, shall be deemed to prohibit the payment of reasonable compensation to employees and independent contractors for services provided for the benefit of the organization. This organization shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on by an organization exempt from federal income tax. The organization shall not endorse, contribute to, work for, or otherwise support (or oppose) a candidate for public office. The organization is organized exclusively for purposes subsequent to section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

**ARTICLE I
MEETINGS**

Section 1. Annual Meeting. An annual meeting shall be held once each calendar year for the purpose of electing directors and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the meeting. The annual meeting shall be held at the time and place designated by the Board of Directors from time to time.

Section 2. Special Meetings. Special meetings maybe be requested by the President or the Board of Directors.

Section 3. Notice. Written notice of all meetings shall be provided under this section or as otherwise required by law. The Notice shall state the place, date, and hour of meeting, and if for a special meeting, the purpose of the meeting. Such notice shall be mailed to all directors of record at the address shown on the corporate books, at least 10 days prior to the meeting. Such notice shall be deemed effective when deposited in ordinary U.S. mail, properly addressed, with postage prepaid.

Section 4. Place of Meeting. Meetings shall be held at the organization's principal place of business unless otherwise stated in the notice.

Section 5. Quorum. A majority of the directors shall constitute at quorum at a meeting. In the absence of a quorum, a majority of the directors may adjourn the meeting to another time without further notice. If a quorum is represented at an adjourned meeting, any business may be transacted that might have been transacted at the meeting as originally scheduled. The directors

present at a meeting represented by a quorum may continue to transact business until adjournment, even if the withdrawal of some directors results in representation of less than a quorum.

Section 6. Informal Action. Any action required to be taken, or which may be taken, at a meeting, may be taken without a meeting and without prior notice if a consent in writing, setting forth the action so taken, is signed by the directors with respect to the subject matter of the vote.

ARTICLE II DIRECTORS

Section 1. Number of Directors. The organization shall be managed by a Board of Directors consisting of a minimum of 16 director(s).

Section 2. Election and Term of Office. The directors shall be elected at the annual meeting. Each director shall serve a term of 2 year(s), or until a successor has been elected and qualified.

Section 3. Quorum. A majority of directors shall constitute a quorum.

Section 4. Adverse Interest. In the determination of a quorum of the directors, or in voting, the disclosed adverse interest of a director shall not disqualify the director or invalidate his or her vote.

Section 5. Regular Meeting. The Board of Directors shall meet immediately after the election for the purpose of electing its new officers, appointing new committee chairpersons and for transacting such other business as may be deemed appropriate. The Board of Directors may provide, by resolution, for additional regular meetings without notice other than the notice provided by the resolution.

Section 6. Special Meeting. Special meetings may be requested by the President, Vice-President, Secretary, or any two directors by providing five days' written notice by ordinary United States mail, effective when mailed. Minutes of the meeting shall be sent to the Board of Directors within two weeks after the meeting.

Section 7. Procedures. The vote of a majority of the directors present at a properly called meeting at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the Board of Directors, unless the vote of a greater number is required by law or by these by-laws for a particular resolution. A director of the organization who is present at a meeting of the Board of Directors at which action on any corporate matter is taken shall be presumed to have assented to the action taken unless their dissent shall be entered in the minutes of the meeting. The Board shall keep written minutes of its proceedings in its permanent records.

Section 8. Informal Action. Any action required to be taken at a meeting of directors, or any action which may be taken at a meeting of directors or of a committee of directors, may be taken

without a meeting if a consent in writing setting forth the action so taken, is signed by all of the directors or all of the members of the committee of directors, as the case may be.

Section 9. Removal / Vacancies. A director shall be subject to removal, with or without cause, at a meeting called for that purpose. Any vacancy that occurs on the Board of Directors, whether by death, resignation, removal or any other cause, may be filled by the remaining directors. A director elected to fill a vacancy shall serve the remaining term of his or her predecessor, or until a successor has been elected and qualified.

Section 10. Committees. To the extent permitted by law, the Board of Directors may appoint from its members a committee or committees, temporary or permanent, and designate the duties, powers and authorities of such committees.

- a. **Core Committees.** The organization shall consist of 3 core committees with each maintaining their own guidelines and regulations:
 - a. **Governance Committee**
 - b. **Revenue Committee**
 - c. **Distribution Committee**

ARTICLE III OFFICERS

Section 1. Number of Officers. The officers of the organization shall be a President, one or more Vice-Presidents (as determined by the Board of Directors), a Treasurer, and a Secretary. Two or more offices may be held by one person. The President may not serve concurrently as a Vice President.

- a. **President/Chairman.** The President shall be the chief executive officer and shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Directors and its Executive Committee, if such a committee is created by the Board.
- b. **Vice President.** The Vice President shall perform the duties of the President in the absence of the President and shall assist that office in the discharge of its leadership duties.
- c. **Secretary.** The Secretary shall give notice of all meetings of the Board of Directors and Executive Committee, shall keep an accurate list of the directors, and shall have the authority to certify any records, or copies of records, as the official records of the organization. The Secretary shall maintain the minutes of the Board of Directors' meetings and all committee meetings.
- d. **Treasurer/CFO.** The Treasurer shall be responsible for conducting the financial affairs of the organization as directed and authorized by the Board of Directors and Executive Committee, if any, and shall make reports of corporate finances as required, but no less often than at each meeting of the Board of Directors and Executive Committee.

Section 2. Election and Term of Office. The officers shall be elected annually by the Board of Directors at the first meeting of the Board of Directors, immediately following the annual meeting. Each officer shall serve a one year term or until a successor has been elected and qualified.

Section 3. Removal or Vacancy. The Board of Directors shall have the power to remove an officer or agent of the organization. Any vacancy that occurs for any reason may be filled by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV CORPORATE SEAL, EXECUTION OF INSTRUMENTS

The organization shall not have a corporate seal. All instruments that are executed on behalf of the organization which are acknowledged and which affect an interest in real estate shall be executed by the President or any Vice-President and the Secretary or Treasurer. All other instruments executed by the organization, including a release of mortgage or lien, may be executed by the President or any Vice-President. Notwithstanding the preceding provisions of this section, any written instrument may be executed by any officer(s) or agent(s) that are specifically designated by resolution of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE V AMENDMENT TO BYLAWS

The bylaws may be amended, altered, or repealed by the Board of Directors by a majority of a quorum vote at any regular or special meeting. The text of the proposed change shall be distributed to all board members at least ten (10) days before the meeting.

ARTICLE VI INDEMNIFICATION

Any director or officer who is involved in litigation by reason of his or her position as a director or officer of this organization shall be indemnified and held harmless by the organization to the fullest extent authorized by law as it now exists or may subsequently be amended (but, in the case of any such amendment, only to the extent that such amendment permits the organization to provide broader indemnification rights).

ARTICLE VII DISSOLUTION

The organization may be dissolved only with authorization of its Board of Directors given at a special meeting called for that purpose, and with the subsequent approval by no less than two-

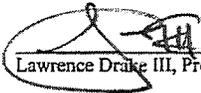
thirds (2/3) vote of the members. In the event of the dissolution of the organization, the assets shall be applied and distributed as follows:

All liabilities and obligations shall be paid, satisfied and discharged, or adequate provision shall be made therefore. Assets not held upon a condition requiring return, transfer, or conveyance to any other organization or individual shall be distributed, transferred, or conveyed, in trust or otherwise, to charitable and educational organization, organized under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, of a similar or like nature to this organization, as determined by the Board of Directors.

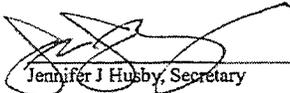

Conflict of Interest Policy

ARTICLE I

PROCEDURES

3.1 Duty to Disclose

In connection with any actual or possible conflict of interest, an interested person must disclose the existence of the financial interest and be given the opportunity to disclose all material facts to the directors and members of committees with governing board delegated powers considering the proposed transaction or arrangement.

3.2 Determining Whether a Conflict of Interest Exists

After disclosure of the financial interest and all material facts, and after any discussion with the interested person, he/she shall leave the governing board or committee meeting while the determination of a conflict of interest is discussed and voted upon. The remaining board or committee members shall decide if a conflict of interest exists.

3.3 Procedures for Addressing the Conflict of Interest

(a) An interested person may make a presentation at the governing board or committee meeting, but after the presentation, he/she shall leave the meeting during the discussion of, and the vote on, the transaction or arrangement involving the possible conflict of interest.

(b) The chairperson of the governing board or committee shall, if appropriate, appoint a disinterested person or committee to investigate alternatives to the proposed transaction or arrangement.

(c) After exercising due diligence, the governing board or committee shall determine whether the corporation can obtain with reasonable efforts a more advantageous transaction or arrangement from a person or entity that would not give rise to a conflict of interest.

(d) If a more advantageous transaction or arrangement is not reasonably possible under circumstances not producing a conflict of interest, the governing board or committee shall determine by a majority vote of the disinterested directors whether the transaction or arrangement is in the corporation's best interest, for its own benefit, and whether it is fair and reasonable. In conformity with the above determination it shall make its decision as to whether to enter into the transaction or arrangement.

3.4 Violations of the Conflicts of Interest Policy

(a) If the governing board or committee has reasonable cause to believe a member has failed to disclose actual or possible conflicts of interest, it shall inform the member of the basis for such belief and afford the member an opportunity to explain the alleged failure to disclose.

(b) If, after hearing the member's response and after making further investigation as warranted by the circumstances, the governing board or committee determines the member has failed to disclose an actual or possible conflict of interest, it shall take appropriate disciplinary and corrective action.

ARTICLE II

RECORDS OF PROCEEDINGS

4.1 Minutes

The minutes of the governing board and all committees with board delegated powers shall contain:

(a) The names of the persons who disclosed or otherwise were found to have a financial interest in connection with an actual or possible conflict of interest, the nature of the financial interest, any action taken to determine whether a conflict of interest was present, and the governing board's or committee's decision as to whether a conflict of interest in fact existed.

(b) The names of the persons who were present for discussions and votes relating to the transaction or arrangement, the content of the discussion, including any alternatives to the proposed transaction or arrangement, and a record of any votes taken in connection with the proceedings.

ARTICLE III

COMPENSATION

5.1 A voting member of the governing board who receives compensation, directly or indirectly, from the corporation for services is precluded from voting on matters pertaining to that member's compensation.

5.2 A voting member of any committee whose jurisdiction includes compensation matters and who receives compensation, directly or indirectly, from the corporation for services is precluded from voting on matters pertaining to that member's compensation.

5.3 No voting member of the governing board or any committee whose jurisdiction includes compensation matters and who receives compensation, directly or indirectly, from the corporation, either individually or collectively, is prohibited from providing information to any committee regarding compensation.

ARTICLE IV

ANNUAL STATEMENTS

Each director, principal officer and member of a committee with governing board delegated powers shall annually sign a statement which affirms such person:

- (a) Has received a copy of the conflicts of interest policy,
- (b) Has read and understands the policy,
- (c) Has agreed to comply with the policy, and
- (e) Understands that the corporation is charitable and in order to maintain its federal tax exemption it must engage primarily in activities which accomplish one or more of its tax-exempt purposes.

ARTICLE V

PERIODIC REVIEWS

To ensure the corporation operates in a manner consistent with charitable purposes and does not engage in activities that could jeopardize its tax-exempt status, periodic reviews shall be conducted. The periodic reviews shall, at a minimum, include the following subjects:

- (a) Whether compensation arrangements and benefits are reasonable, based on competent survey information and the result of arm's length bargaining.
- (b) Whether partnerships, joint ventures, and arrangements with management corporations conform to the corporation's written policies, are properly recorded, reflect reasonable investment or payments for goods and services, further charitable purposes and do not result in inurement, impermissible private benefit or in an excess benefit transaction.

ARTICLE VI

USE OF OUTSIDE EXPERTS

When conducting the periodic reviews as provided for in Article VII, the corporation may, but need not, use outside advisors. If outside experts are used, their use shall not relieve the governing board of its responsibility for ensuring periodic reviews are conducted.

Executive Summary

Background – Mona Lisa Restaurant & Banquets, Inc., a Michigan corporation, doing business as Amaseena Restaurant and Bar (Applicant), has made application to the Michigan Liquor Control Commission (MLCC) for the transfer of ownership of an escrowed 2016 Class C liquor license from Z & A Holdings, Inc. The escrowed license is from and will remain at 7750 Metropolitan Parkway, Sterling Heights, MI 48312. Applicant is also seeking a new catering permit, Sunday Sale permit (a.m. and p.m.), outdoor service area, and new dance-entertainment permit.

Applicant is acquiring the Class C liquor license from Z & A Holdings, Inc., which is also the landlord under a lease agreement with Applicant for the licensed premises. Z & A Holdings, Inc. acquired the escrowed liquor license in January 2015; however, it never operated a restaurant business at 7750 Metropolitan Parkway. The Class C liquor license has remained in escrow until the sale to the Applicant. The MLCC has approved Applicant for a Conditional License pending issuance of a regular Class C liquor license.

Applicant is owned 100% by Anthony Hanna. Mr. Hanna will be responsible for the daily management and operation of the business, but plans on hiring an experienced manager once the business is open and has developed a customer base to support a full-time manager. While Applicant's owner does not have previous liquor license or restaurant experience, he is a businessman with management experience.

Applicant will operate the restaurant under the business name of Amaseena Restaurant and Bar and will offer patrons a full menu with multiple entrées, specializing primarily in Middle Eastern cuisine. The restaurant / banquet facility floor plan offers sit-down seating for about 55 patrons in the restaurant area and 212 patrons in the banquet area. Additional, future plans include outdoor seating in the front of the building for up to 28 patrons. The proposed hours of operation are daily from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 a.m.; however shorter hours of

operation are anticipated until a customer base is developed. When the outdoor seating is operational, Applicant plans for the outdoor seating to close at approximately 9:00 p.m. Applicant plans to be open to the public for breakfast, lunch and dinner in the restaurant, and will possibly close the restaurant when holding banquets. Applicant is seeking a new dance-entertainment permit for music (live band or DJ) and dancing to coincide with the banquet operations. Permits coinciding with this approval include Sunday Sales (a.m. and p.m.), catering (for off premises serving), Outdoor Service and Dance-Entertainment (primarily for the banquet room operation).

The Police Department, Fire Department, Office of Planning, Office of Building Services and Office of Treasury have completed their respective reviews and report no objections to the application.

Since this is an application to *transfer* the liquor license at the same location in Sterling Heights, it will have **no effect** on the number of City quota licenses available.

The MLCC has approved a conditional license for the Applicant at the premises, and the decision on a regular license is pending with a decision expected soon.

Recommendation – City Administration is recommending **disapproval** of the Applicant’s request. The following criteria from §5-34(G) of the City Code support this recommendation:

(1) The Applicant’s management experience in the alcohol/liquor business

Applicant’s owner has no management experience whatsoever in the operation of a liquor licensed business (City Code §5-34(G)(1)). There is no evidence that a manager with requisite experience will be available to mitigate the owner’s inexperience.

(9) The effects that the issuance of a license would have on the health, safety and welfare of the general public.

City Administration is concerned that owner’s limited managerial experience, no restaurant management experience, no liquor license experience, combined with no immediate plans to hire an experienced manager, will put the health, safety, and welfare of the general public at risk.

(18) The permanence of the establishment in the community as evidenced by the proposed or actual commitments made by the Applicant

The Applicant’s proposal lacks a coherent, well-conceived business plan that increases the likelihood that the proposed liquor licensed establishment will succeed.

(19) Other Relevant Considerations

Owner’s proposal appears to demonstrate that the proposed restaurant use is ancillary to the banquet use. Applicant did not provide a menu with its application. Consequently, there is potential for the sale of liquor becoming the predominant source of revenue. City Council has typically not been receptive to requests where there is a dependence upon a liquor license to stay in business. The on-premises sale of alcohol is supposed to be amenity that enhances the restaurant, not the reason it can stay in business.

Should City Council consider recommending approval of the transfer request to the MLCC, the following criteria from §5-34(G) of the City Code support this recommendation:

(2) The Applicant’s general business management experience;

Applicant has general business experience as a real estate agent, business team leader, supplemented by work for a medical distribution company and insurance office management.

(10) The recommendations of the local law enforcement agency, Building Department, Zoning Department and Fire Department with regard to the proposed facility;

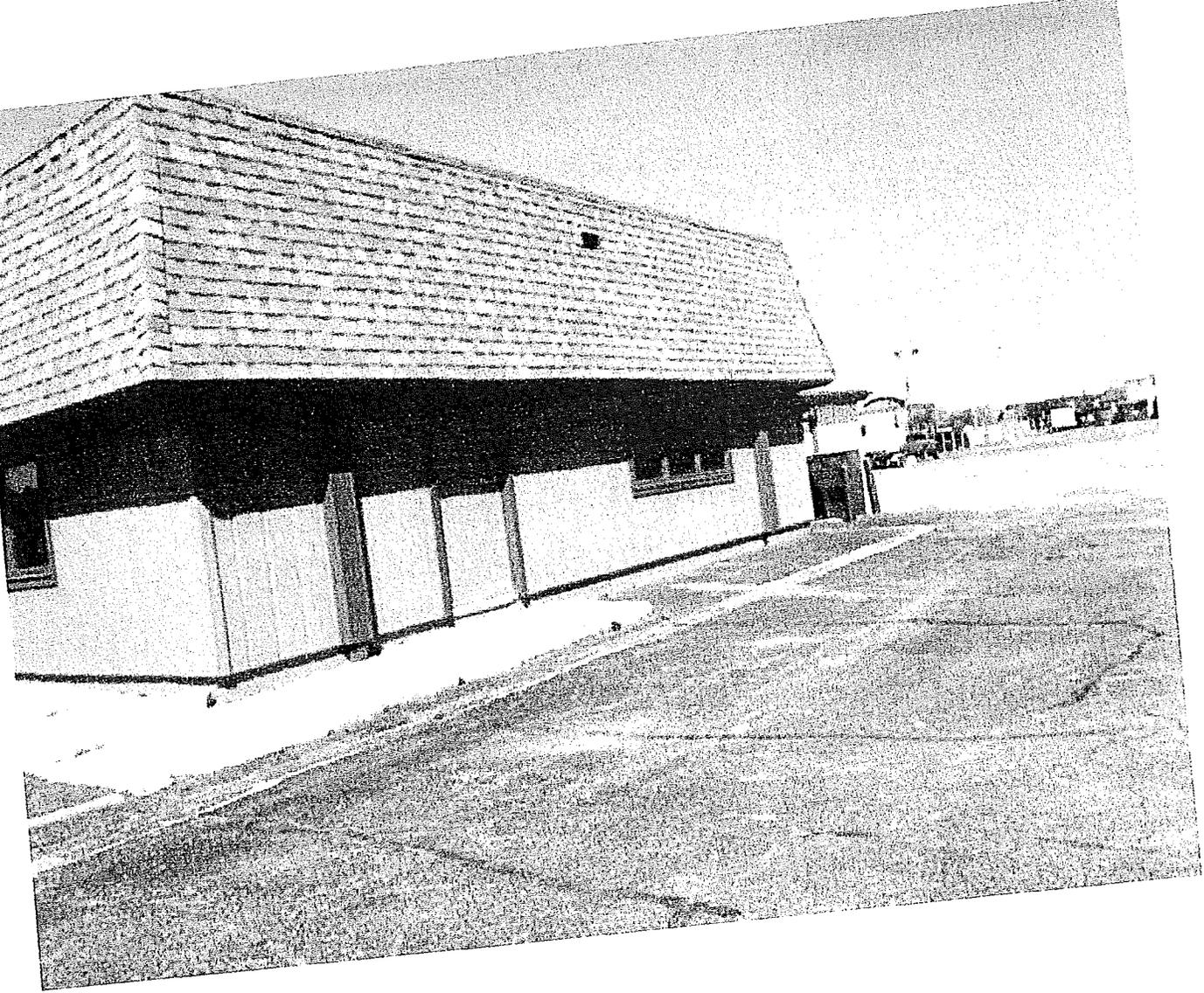


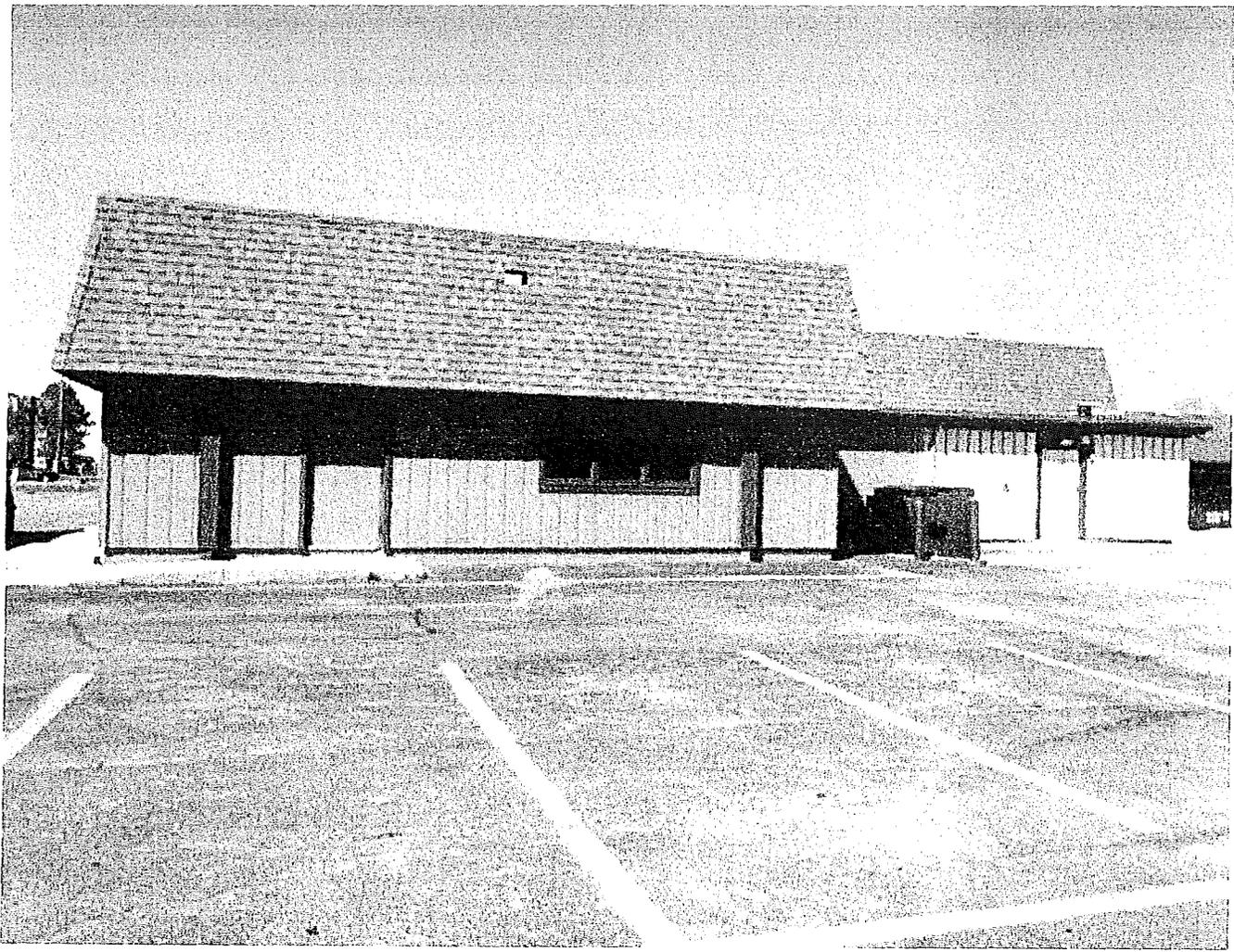
Blue Print FLOOR PLAN

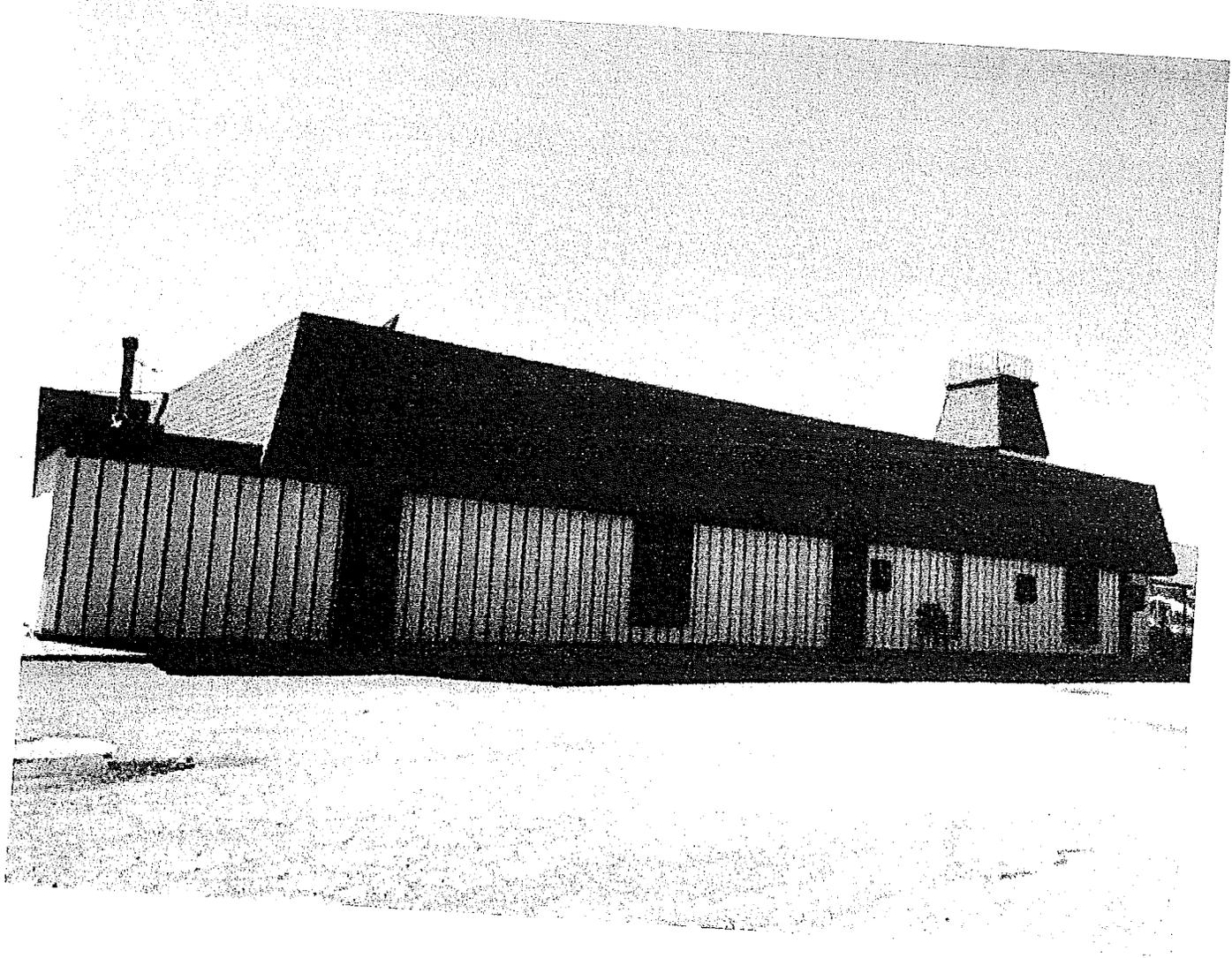

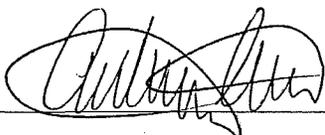

6. APPLICANT agrees that the City Manager shall have the discretion to forward the results of the investigation to the City Council with a recommendation for revocation or non-renewal proceedings.
